Board of Director's Meeting Highlights: September 10, 2012

Topics raised were:

- Two residents attended the meeting.
- Approval for location of a children's play set.
- Poor quality of some repair work in progress.
- Can residents get together and get a better price for treating ash trees.
- We have met with our lawyers to establish legal methods for enforcing the Covenants and Restrictions.
- We have restructured the Architectural Committee to conform to the Covenants and Restrictions.
- We have begun tabulating where and how many totes are not being stored properly. See more details elsewhere in this newsletter.
- The Five Year plan is completed.
- Repairs of the Eveningwood pool and the Greenwoods pool will start this fall. Funds will be reallocated from the remodeling of the Greenwoods Meeting room and legal expenses. Cost,

including winterizing the pools, will be on the order of \$43,500.

- Eighteen liens have been filed for overdue assessments.
- The 2013 budget process has begun.
- We are looking into some form of shelter from the sun for the Glen Oaks playground.
- There is a possibility that residents of Bantry Green I may start to join Ransom Oaks.



Do You Know Where Your Totes Are?

As many have notice, and reported to us, the number of residents that are not properly storing their totes is increasing. As a community that collectively cares about the appearance and values of our homes we had hoped that residents would follow the Covenants and Restrictions which require that garbage (and by implication recycling) containers should not be visible except on the day that pickup is made.

We decided to tabulate just how many residents conformed to the C&R. To do this we divided the single family homes of Ransom Oaks into 16 Zones and counted totes that are visible from the street in each Zone. Note, we did not attempt to find totes that were visible from other vantage points. The results are shown in Table 1.

Some interesting observations from the count made on September 5, 2012:

- (1) Zone 6 has over 87% compliance. That is nearly 9 out of 10
- (2) Zones 3, 4, 5, 8, and 9 all have over 70 % compliance
- (3) Zone 16 has just 36% compliance and Zones 13 and 14 have less than 50% compliance.

Isn't it disturbing that over 350 residents can go that extra mile to help Ransom Oaks look as good as possible while over 200 don't seem to participate?

Here are some other interesting facts. We took a ride through some nearby housing areas and found the following:

- (1) Fawn Meadows. Hidden Totes = 62.5%
- (2) Whispering Meadow through to Rambling to New Rd. Hidden Totes = 56%.

And some of these homes have only single car garages.

(3) Deer Run Hidden Totes = 84%.

Note, NONE of these housing areas have any rules about totes!!!

Over the coming months we will continue to collect these statistics and report them here.

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Electrical Safety in the Home - Power Strips

Electrical outlets can become dangerous when overloaded. Though it may be easy to simply plug in another power strip or extension cord when adding equipment, the wiring in some homes often isn't capable of supporting too many high-powered electronic appliances.

So what's the big deal?

Overloads of an electrical outlet means that more current is running through the outlet than it can handle. This causes the outlet to overheat, which may lead to an electrical fire. According to the National Fire Protection Association study, electrical circuits and lighting equipment are involved in more then 24,000 home structure fires per year. These fires have resulted in an average of 320 deaths per year and an estimated \$700 million in property damage per year.

To help prevent this and other electrical hazards the following list is provided by **Electrical Safety Foundation International.**

- If you must use a power strip, use a name-brand product from a reputable retailer. Low-quality or counterfeit power strips may contain wiring that isn't adequate to carry the load
- Place power strips where there is plenty of air circulation to dispense the heat.
- Never attempt to plug grounded (three-prong) cords into an ungrounded (two-prong) outlet.
- Do not bind, kink or knot electrical cords.
- Keep cords close to the wall to prevent risk of tripping.



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
